

**REPORT TO THE
MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF
CARBON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
REGULAR MEETING
Tuesday, November 5, 2013
County Courthouse, Rawlins, Wyoming**

The regular meeting of the Board of Carbon County Commissioners (BOCC) commenced Tuesday, November 5, 2013 at the County Courthouse in Rawlins, Wyoming. Attending the meeting were; Vice Chairman John Espy; Commissioners Sue Jones and John Johnson; Deputy County Attorney Mike Kelly; and Deputy Clerk Ashley Jolly. Chairman Leo Chapman and Commissioner Lindy Glode were absent.

Vice Chairman Espy called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

Vice Chairman Espy stated that the executive session this afternoon at 2:45 is to be removed from the agenda. The agenda will stand as amended.

CONSENT AGENDA

Commissioner Johnson moved to approve the consent agenda. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

The following items were on the consent agenda. October 15, 2013 regular meeting minutes; \$1,000.00 bond for John F. O'Grady, Treasurer for the Carbon County Museum Board; Planning & Zoning receipts for \$1,710.00; Clerk receipts for \$22,293.75; Attorney receipts for \$173.70; letter from the BOCC to Wyoming State Parks & Cultural Resources thanking them for awarding the Medicine Bow Museum funds; letter from the BOCC to the Wyoming Business Council supporting Elk Mountain's community facilities grant application for a new community center complex.

ELECTED OFFICIALS / DEPARTMENT HEADS

Clerk

Ashley Jolly, Deputy Clerk reported Clerk Bartlett was absent as she is attending the Laramie County Election to review their equipment and procedures.

Ms. Jolly presented the 2014 Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) agreement for the Chairman's signature and the Contracts for Services with subgrantees for this grant. Ms. Jolly also advised them that the contract has not been received yet and would like to get authorization so that when we receive the contract the Chairman may sign at that time. Ms. Jolly stated that the grant started October 1 and the subgrantees cannot use their money until the agreement is signed.

Commissioner Jones moved to authorize the Vice Chairman to sign the 2014 Community Services Block Grant Agreement and the Contracts for Services Agreements related to this grant with the county's Youth Crisis Center, Carbon County Public Health, Boys & Girls Clubs of Carbon County and Greater Wyoming Big Brothers Big Sisters. Commissioner Johnson seconded and asked if the Chairman should sign it instead. Commissioner Jones moved to amend the motion authorizing the Chairman's signature instead of the Vice Chairman. Commissioner Johnson seconded the amended motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Jolly reported Randy Manring resigned from the Library Board effective immediately. She added the Clerk's Office would advertise the opening.

Commissioner Johnson moved to accept the resignation from Randy Manring of the Library Board and direct the Clerk's Office to advertise the opening. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Assessor

Cheryl Ross, County Assessor presented abates and rebates for the Vice Chairman's signature.

Clerk

Debbie Gorney, Deputy Clerk in Human Resources discussed the family rate for the county's dental plan. She noted Clerk Bartlett recommends reducing this to \$80.00, less than the recently set Cobra rate.

Commissioner Johnson moved to reduce the family rate for dental insurance to \$80.00 effective as soon as can be administratively handled. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Treasurer

Cindy Baldwin, County Treasurer reported taxes are being collected as the due date approaches. Treasurer Baldwin presented an overview of the money we are holding on the Museum's behalf and the new fuel tax that goes into the SCRF road account. She also discussed the Jail's Operations & Maintenance account which is used for any maintenance at the jail. She gave a

brief overview of the county's values. Treasurer Baldwin reported she plans to invest any excess revenue the county receives from various sources.

Attorney

Mike Kelly, Deputy County Attorney reported the DKRW Medicine Bow Fuel & Power and Industrial Siting Council's meeting is scheduled for December 18, 2013 at 10 a.m. in the great hall of the Platte Valley Community Center in Saratoga.

Mr. Kelly presented the Fiscal Year 2014 contract for the Victims Witness Program. There was discussion on who is in charge of tracking the grant money.

Commissioner Jones moved to approve the Fiscal Year 2014 Contract for Services to Victims of Crime between Division of Victim Services and Carbon County Sheriffs Victims Witness program in the amount not to exceed \$71,806.00 to provide services to victims of crimes. Commissioner Johnson seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Buildings & Grounds

Craig Jones notified the Commissioners that water testing has been done in the Town of Dixon and the Dixon Senior Center had unusually high amounts of copper in their water. Senior Services is concerned about the results. Mr. Jones has been in contact with the local Culligan distributor to find a solution for the problem and has suggested a water softener system and reverse osmosis system. The two system installations are estimated to cost \$2,025.50. Mr. Jones stated there is money in the buildings maintenance budget to do this he just needs the BOCC's approval to do these repairs. There was discussion of the recurring costs of these systems. There was also discussion as to why the Dixon Senior Center is the only building in the community with high levels of copper. Commissioner Jones requested we do our own test before we commit to these systems and then if the test still shows high levels of copper to pursue the purchase of these systems.

Commissioner Jones moved that the county does its own water test at the Dixon Senior Center. Commissioner Johnson seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Johnson moved that if the sample from the Dixon Senior Center water test comes back with high amounts of copper to move forward with the purchase and installation of a water softener system and reverse osmosis system for the Dixon Senior Center. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Jones stated LONG will be here this afternoon to discuss the Carbon Building HVAC and doors and windows project. Mr. Jones gave an update on the Hanna Senior Center project noting it should be completed by the end of this week. Commissioner Jones suggested that the county not pay the contractor until Mr. Jones is completely satisfied with the quality of workmanship of this project. The BOCC discussed the status of the repairs of the electrical system at the multiplex building at the Fairgrounds. Mr. Jones stated he will get with Andy Herring at the Fairgrounds to figure out the issues and try and get them repaired. Mr. Jones stated there are also

issues with the automatic sinks at the Fairgrounds and he has the parts to repair those.

Planning & Zoning

Sid Fox, County Planning Director and Tom Powell, Planner/GIS Specialist gave an update on a recent Bureau of Land Management cooperators meeting that Mr. Powell attended regarding the Visual Resource Management ACEC Environmental Assessment (EA). At the meeting they discussed the comments that were submitted for the draft EA and the deadline for these comments was extended. The draft on these findings should be released by the first of the year. Mr. Fox made the BOCC aware of a series of meetings November 12-14 regarding Baggs and Dixon community assessments.

Mr. Fox stated he is currently on the Urban Systems Committee and his term is due to expire at the end of the year. He stated that this board is mainly focused in the Rawlins area on transportation. Mr. Fox is glad to serve on this board but if one of the County Commissioners would like to serve on this board he would gladly let them. The purpose of the Urban Systems Committee was discussed. Bill Nation, Road and Bridge Superintendant discussed what county roads could qualify for funds from this committee.

Coroner

Paul Zamora, County Coroner informed the BOCC that the Carbon County Coroners Conference is this week and invited them all to attend.

Sheriff

Jerry Colson, County Sheriff opened seven sealed bids for a new pickup truck. Bids received were from Dallin Motors in the amount of \$24,016.00 for a 2014 Dodge 1/2 ton crew cab; Skyline Motors in the amount of \$31,212.00 for a 2014 Chevrolet Silverado crew cab; Fremont Motors in the amount of \$28,410.92 for a 2013 Ford F150; Fremont Motors in the amount of \$24,280.00 for a 2014 Tradesman 1500 crew cab; Greiner Motors in the amount of \$22,354.00 for a 2014 Ford F150 crew cab; Greiner Motors in the amount of \$26,334.00 for a 2014 GMC 1500 Sierra crew cab; and Greiner Motors in the amount of \$23,154.00 for a 2014 1500 Tradesman Express crew cab.

Sheriff Colson stated he will review the bids and come back later to make a recommendation.

Sheriff Colson presented the Provider Agreement with Natrona County noting it is rarely used as most juveniles currently go to Sweetwater County.

Commissioner Johnson moved to approve the Provider Agreement with the Natrona County Sheriff to house juveniles. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Road & Bridge

Bill Nation, Road & Bridge Superintendant reported on current Road & Bridge work. Mr. Nation informed the BOCC that the Dad/Wamsutter Road was completed and they will advertise for the Certificate of Completion. Mr. Nation stated the bridge inspections are continuing and should be completed so he can present the results at the November 19 meeting. Commissioner Jones complimented Mr. Nation about Road & Bridge work. Commissioner Johnson commented about a cattle guard that needs to be checked out. Mr. Nation stated he has yet to hire a mechanic and is down two operators due to various reasons.

RECESS

Vice Chairman Espy called a recess at 10:19 a.m. and reconvened at 10:32 a.m.

Attorney – Crisis Center

Deputy Attorney Dawnessa Snyder presented a Lease Agreement and relating Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the Crisis Center. Ms. Snyder had Greg Wise with Pence and Macmillan on the phone. She explained the agreements require the county provide \$100,000.00 annually through the terms in addition to grants the county must sponsor. The MOU also requires the county provide a 2010 or newer vehicle the first year and that this will be deducted from the \$100,000.00. Sharon Weber with the Cathedral Home was phoned in and discussed her background with the Cathedral Home for Children and Laramie Youth Crisis Center.

Commissioner Johnson moved to approve the Memorandum of Understanding with Cathedral Home for Children to run the county's Youth Crisis Center for the period of November 1, 2013 through June 30, 2016 not to exceed \$100,000.00 per year. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Jones moved to approve the Lease Agreement between Carbon County and Cathedral Home for Children to run the county's Youth Crisis Center for the period of November 1, 2013 through June 30, 2016. Commissioner Johnson seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Jolly asked if the BOCC would like a brand new vehicle that would have a full warranty or a used vehicle. The BOCC stated that a new vehicle would be best and the vehicle should not exceed \$36,000.00. The BOCC authorized Clerk Bartlett to request and accept bids for this vehicle. Ms Snyder stated there will be an open house for the Crisis Center on November 21, 2013 from 4-6 p.m. and all commissioners are invited to attend.

Sheriff

Sheriff Colson returned and recommended accepting the low bid from Greiner Motors for a 2014 Ford F150 crew cab in the amount of \$22,354.00. Sheriff Colson also stated that they will accept our trade of a 2004 GMC with 263,000 miles and they are giving us \$3,150.00 for the trade. It was agreed that since \$30,000.00 was budgeted, Sheriff Colson would use the remaining money to outfit the vehicle.

Commissioner Johnson moved to accept the bid from Greiner Motors for a 2014 Ford F150 crew cab in the amount of \$22,354.00. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

MEMORIAL HOSPITAL OF CARBON COUNTY (MHCC) UPDATE

Ned Hill, Chief Executive Officer and David Pike, Chief Financial Officer (CFO) presented a financial statement as of September 2013. Hospital board member David Cesko MD was also present.

Dr. Cesko discussed the new ICD-10 coding system that is to be implemented and mandatory by the end of October 2014. He stated that due to this new coding system the hospital should have about 90 days cash on hand and as of right now the hospital has about 7-10 days cash on hand. The average hospital has about 75 days cash on hand. Dr. Cesko stated that various things are coming up including moving Dr. Sridharan to Dr. Schulze's office and a Medicaid enrollment specialist is going to be hired. Dr. Cesko also discussed the issues with the heating/cooling and intercom systems. Commissioner Jones asked when the hospital's cost report was due and asked about the billing service. There was discussion on where a patient can pay a bill and the BOCC suggested making it as easy as possible.

Ms. Thayer stated the committee is made up of 12 agencies including the Wyoming Frontier Prison, Rawlins Daily Times, Office of Tourism, Carbon County Visitors Council, Carbon County Higher Education, Carbon County Museum, City of Rawlins, Rec Services, Rawlins Economic Development Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, DDA/Main Street and Wyoming Business Council. The Certified Tourism Community status report and City of Rawlins Tourism Assessment that was revised October 2013 was discussed. Ms. Thayer discussed the three tier requirements and stated they are starting on tier three.

MUSEUM
